Educational programs planned, implemented and evaluated by the Texas AgriLIFE Extension Ag./Natural Resources committee included: Private Applicators Pesticide Training, Advanced Beef, Pasture and Range Short Course, Crop Tour, Brush Management, and a Beef Cattle Management Series (Herd Health Seminar, Reproduction Management, Advanced Animal Breeding, and Assisting at Calving). These programs addressed the local needs of Area Producers and were attended by over 150 local and area producers and interested clientele. Beef Cattle Management, Pesticide Testing Training, Crop Tour, Brush Management, and Soil Fertility.

Work has been coordinated in 2008 with local municipalities, school districts, Cities of George West & Three Rivers, Soil & Water Conservation and Chamber of Commerce addressing environmental, pesticide safety, beautification of Community, Vocational & Technical Training in Public Schools, youth development and other issues identified during the Texas Community Futures Forum. These programs have been implemented in an effort to address the critical issues and improve local quality of life. I am also involved with the GWISD Site Base Committee that helps address issues on education.


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4-H & Youth Development

Youth Programs in Live Oak County are as follows: Livestock Projects, Photography, Food/Nutrition, Clothing and Textiles, Wildlife, Outdoors, Veterinarian Science, Entomology, Leadership, & Community Service. A total of **291** 4-H youth members have enrolled in 2008. We held an annual "County Camp" this summer. Over **65** youth attended and participated in various activities such as arts & crafts, stick horse rodeo, making peach cobbler on a camp fire, and leadership activities. Every year 4-H youth are involved in numerous community service projects, such as Driscoll Children's Benefit Auction where 4-H youth bring items to sell at the Local Livestock Auction. We have raised over **\$100,000** in the last four years for this benefit auction. We use the county camp as a 4-H recruitment in Live Oak County.
